Solutions to Worksheet SJ-NT537 Justified by Faith

Ephesians 2:10

For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

Faith and performing good works for your fellow man go together like body and soul. Neither can be separated from the other.

Note: Paul says that you need faith in Christ first, and then good works (not works of the law) to justify that faith.

- Faith is complete trust in, and obedience to, Jesus Christ.
- Works –Performing good deeds towards fellow man. Examples: feed the hungry, take care of the sick etc.

"I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me."
